### Scavenger hunt at the Museum! Teacher's sheet

Level: A2 upwards



The following worksheet is for use during a visit to the Museum. Please feel free to photocopy for your group.

**Pre-visit:** It would be useful to pre-teach some of the words if the group is a low level. Please also see our other materials on the website to help your group know what to expect.

Other materials: If your pupils are not going to be carrying around a bag, then it is useful to give them another small bag.

Please remind young people at the beginning to take things from the ground only!

#### Clues/comments on what you are likely to find:

Any route you take around the Museum will work to find many things regardless of the season. The idea is also to encourage pupils to be creative and really look. Numbers below refer to our Museum map. Copies are available free of charge on-site.

#### Page 1: Scavenger hunt items to find

- 8. The smooth item might be a piece of flint that is in the ground and there is chalk in the ground which is easy to find near the shop.
- 9. Look near the mill.
- 12. Can of course not be found; but worth explaining to the children why, which are hens and which is the cockerel. You will normally find them between the stables, Bayleaf Farmhouse (map no.12) and Winkhurst Tudor kitchen (no. 14).

#### Page 2: Senses trail

- 13. You could take a group for a little walk along the woodland path from the Downland Gridshell (no. 48) or stand at another point and you should hear birds.
- 16. Possible from many areas but especially from the market square
- 19. Fires in the houses are seasonal, but Winkhurst Tudor kitchen (no. 14) uses fires to cook on many days of the year. Also you will notice in some houses that you can smell smoke from a fire even when one is not lit.
- 23. There is an old mill stone outside the mill (no. 40). You can of course not touch anything working in the mill. There is also a smaller quern stone designed for demonstrations, normally just inside the entrance to the mill.

#### **Continuation project ideas:**

Depending on the age of the group you may like to create a storyboard from your visit; ask the students to create a board game based on the vocabulary and items they have seen or create a similar hunt for another location.
